ROYAL ASIATIC SOCIETY.—The ordinary meeting of the above society took place on Saturday last, Professor Wilson in the chair. Sir G. Staunton said that he had received a letter from the executors of the late Thos. Manning, Esq., stating that that gentleman had bequeathed to the society the whole of his valuable collection of Chinese books. As Mr. Manning had been for many years a resident in China, and had made considerable proficiency in the language of the country, his library was composed of the choicest and most valuable specimens of the literary productions of that interesting people. It was a most important acquisition to the library of the society, and he (Sir G. Staunton) moved "that the special thanks of the society be communicated to the executors of the late Thos. Manning, Esq., for the donation, and that the collection be deposited apart from the others, and entitled 'the Manning collection.'" Mr. Ball seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously. Mr. Stevens read a paper regarding the modern deities worshipped by the Hindoos, after which the society adjourned.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR.

The first column on the left-hand page for each month shows the day of the month; the second, the corresponding day of the week; the third, the Sundays, Royal Birth-days, Holidays, Terms, &c.; the fourth, the Sun's rising and setting; the fifth, the Moon's rising or setting. On the right-hand page for each month, the first column shows the days of the month; the second, the time of high water just above London New Bridge; the third, the equation of time. The remainder of the right-hand page exhibits the Moon's changes; and the rising and setting of the Planets on the 1st, 13th, and 25th, days of each month.

In the column of Sun rises and sets, the figures are to be read thus:—Suppose Feb. 1st, 7 28 5; Sun rises 28 m. after 7, and sets 28 m. before 5; and so of others. The Moon's setting is shown from the New to the Full Moon, her rising from the Full Moon to the New.

The column marked Sun fast and slow, shows how much the time on a correct sun-dial is slower or faster than the time which ought to be given by a watch. When, therefore, the column is headed slow, you must add so many minutes and seconds; when it is headed fast, subtract them; to get the true time to which a clock or watch should be set.

ECLIPSES IN 1832.

Two: both of the Sun.

1. Feb. 1. An invisible eclipse of the Sun.

2. July 27. A visible eclipse of the Sun. Begins 2h. 3m. P.M. Greatest obscuration, 2h. 15m. Ends 2h. 28m. Digits eclipsed, one-fifth dig. In Scotland and our northern counties this will not be an eclipse.

* * On the 5th of May there will be a *Transit of Mercury* over the Sun's disc. Beginning, or ingress, 9h. 2m. 26s. A.M. End, or egress, 3h. 53m. 20s. P.M. apparent time.

† † Occultations.—Venus will undergo an occultation behind the Moon, Feb. 28; Saturn, April 11; and again May 8.—For the principal occultations of the fixed stars, see White's *Ephemeris*.

GENERAL POST-OFFICE, LONDON.

In addition to the ordinary receiving houses, branch offices are opened at Charing-cross, Vere-street, Oxford-street, Borough of Southwark, and in Lombard-street,—for the receipt of inland, foreign, and ship letters. The branch offices at Charing-cross, Borough of Southwark, and Vere-street, are open for the receipt of letters until a quarter before 7; the office in Lombard-street remains open until 7, after which hour no letters can be received except at the General Post Office in St. Martin's-le-grand.

On the foreign post nights, viz., Tuesday and Friday, foreign letters will be received at Charing-cross, Boro. of Southwark, and Vere-street, until 8 p.m. and in Lombard-street until 11 p.m. Foreign Letters must be paid for, and India Letters put into the East India House.

Newspapers to be forwarded by the post of the same night must be put into the branch offices before 5 p.m.—To go post free to any part of Great Britain, they must be open at each end; any writing or enclosure subjects them to a treble postage. To the East Indies they pay one penny per ounce; and by an Act of a late session of Parliament, they are to be forwarded to the British colonies at a charge of three half-pence each, and are required to be put into a Post Office on the day of publication.

N. B. A Clerk regularly attends at the *Money Order Office*, from 9 till 6, and guarantees the safe conveyance of sums payable at sight by the Dep. Post-Masters in the country, Edinburgh, or Dublin, who also receive money, and give orders at sight on the Office in London.

The 5 Geo. 4. cap. 20. exempts from penalty parties who send letters by any private friend, in his or her way of journey or travel, so as such letter shall be delivered by such friend of the party to whom such letter shall be directed.

Covers containing one or more patterns of cloth, silk, stuff, or goods, not exceeding one ounce in weight, shall be chargeable as a single letter, so as every such packet or cover shall be sent open at the side, and without any letter or writing in, upon, or with, such packet or cover, other than the name of the person sending the same, and the place of his abode, and the prices of the articles affixed thereto or contained therein. Petitions may be sent in the same way.

FRANKS.—No letter directed by or to any Member of Parliament is exempted from postage if it exceed one ounce in weight. No letter directed by any M. P. shall be exempted unless he shall be actually in the post town, or within the limits of its delivery of letters, or within twenty miles of it on the day or the day before it, on which the letter shall be put into the office. No Member is entitled to send free of postage more than ten letters in one day, or to receive more than fifteen.

STAGE COACH REGULATIONS.

As these regulations are very generally disregarded at a little distance from town, the following summary may be found useful.—4 horse coaches may carry 12 outsides; if with luggage on the top, 16 only. 2 and 3 horse coaches may carry 7 outsides; if with luggage on the top, 5 only; in all instances the Guard is included in the No. and the Coachman excluded. Penalty for exceeding the No. 10*l.* each passenger. For having more than 1 passenger on the Box 10*l.* For piling luggage on the roof, the height of which exceeds 10 feet 9 inches from the ground, 5*l.* for every inch it exceeds that No. For refusing to allow a passenger, having paid for his place, or the Toll Collector if called upon by him, to measure luggage, or count passengers, 5*l.* No luggage to be carried on the roof without a distinct division for the same by a rail. There are several other excellent regulations in the Act, vide 50 Geo. III. Cap. 48.

PORTEURAGE.—For any Parcel not weighing more than 50*lb.* and when the distance does not exceed a quarter of a mile 3*d.*—half a mile 4*d.*—a mile 6*d.*—a mile and a half 8*d.*—two miles 10*d.*—and 3*d.* for every addit. half mile. Porters exacting more to be fined 20*s.* or not less than 5*l.*; misbehaving, 20*s.* to 10*l.*

A Ticket to be sent with every parcel, with the charge for carriage and portage marked on it, under a penalty of 40*s.* or not less than 5*l.* Parcels are to be delivered at any place within half a mile of the carriage pavement, in 6 hours after arrival, under a penalty of 20*s.* or not less than 10*s.* Parcels arriving between 4 in the Evening and 7 in the Morning to be delivered in 6 hours from the latter period under the like penalty.

NEW HACKNEY COACH FARES, Jan. 5, 1832.

Distance.—Not exceeding 1 mile, 1s.; exceeding 1 mile, after the rate of 6d. for every half mile, or any fractional part of half mile.

Time.—Not exceeding 30 minutes, 1s.; 45 minutes, 1s. 6d.; 1 hour, 2s.; and so on for any time exceeding 1 hour, at the rate of 6d. for every 15 minutes, or fractional part of 15 minutes.

The driver has the option to charge by distance or time.

A circle of 3 miles from the General Post Office is the limit of the metropolis, within which distance no hack carriage is to be charged. Hack fares payable after 8 in the evening, but not after 5 in the morning.

Coachman compelled to carry a fare to any distance not exceeding 5 miles from the stand from which he was hired.—A bargain made with a driver either for time or distance, if in favour of his fare, can be enforced; if against it, the driver cannot enforce it.

DUTY OF HARBOUR-MASTERS.

By new regulations, adopted in Oct. 1829, the harbour masters' duty at the port of London is strictly defined. Every day two harbour masters superintend the navigation of the Thames during the whole flood tide, and the first two hours after high water, from London-bridge to Blackwall. A harbour master is to continue on duty at night for the last two hours of the flood and first hour of the ebb tides, and has power to stop vessels, &c. or arrange them in their berths. They are to take no fees whatever. The width of the passage to be kept clear through the upper and lower pools is 300 feet, which is marked by buoys. Every barge, lighter, or other craft, is to pass along the river singly and separately, under a penalty of 4*l.*
